

Transformational Changes Needed for a 1.5°C World

The world is at a critical turning point. The message from science is unequivocal: we are running out of time if we want to avoid making irreversible damage to our global commons, which until now have provided a stable foundation for our societies to grow and develop.

We are already seeing the negative impacts of climate change: sea level rise, more extreme droughts, heat waves and storms. The negative impacts often hit the poor and vulnerable the most—exactly those who have contributed the least to creating problem in the first place.

What is needed, building on the findings of the recent IPCC Special Report on 1.5 °C warming, is an urgent and unprecedented transformation in all aspects of our economies. We must begin right now, if we are to have any chance to remain on a trajectory that will enable us to cut current greenhouse gas emissions in half by 2030.

This event will bring together top-level scientists, ministers, mayors and business leaders in an interactive session which will explore the actions needed to accelerate this systemic transformation.

Consistent with the GEF's new four-year investment strategy aimed at catalyzing paradigmatic shifts, the event will focus on two key areas: first, the food system transformation, where an increase in food demand of more than 50% over the coming decades must be achieved, while at the same time the carbon-footprint of food production must be dramatically reduced and its resilience enhanced. Second, urban transformation, where the coming decades offer a one-time opportunity for transformational changes: more than half of the global urban infrastructure the world will need in 2050 is yet to be build. At the same time, we need to fix the existing legacy of massive carbon-intensive and climate-vulnerable urban development.

Examples of the kind of questions to be explored during event are:

- What is your reaction to the results of the new IPCC Report and what does that mean for your country/city/company?
- What are the most important actions that your country/city/company is taking and/or will have to take in the short term to align with the transformational changes called for by the IPCC report?
- What opportunities and challenges do you see for your country/city/company as you embark on implementing these actions? What kinds of new partnership and collaborations will be needed; how can sufficiently broad stakeholders coalitions be built??
- As a leader, what is the one thing you plan to do differently when you return home after this year's climate COP?

It is the intentions to keep the discussion lively and interactive, including allowing for questions from the audience.
