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

GEF Project Modalities

• Full-Sized Project (FSP): over US\$2M

Approval by **Council** (twice a year & intersessional by mail)

- Medium-Sized Project (MSP): US\$2M or less Approval by GEF CEO (on a rolling basis)
- **Program**: longer term and strategic arrangement of individual interlinked projects that aim at achieving large-scale impact
- Child Project: an individual project under Program

\$39 million LDCF/SCCFhave supported5 regional projects




Sectoral Distribution of LDCF/SCCF Projects in the Pacific LDC-SIDS



Work closely with national stakeholder (i.e., governments, the private sector and civil society organization) in the design and implementation of GEF Projects.







- \$10 million initial cap by LDC
- 10% for global/regional initiatives from LDCF

GEF-8

- GEF-7 improvements
- Rio Markers for Climate Change, Biodiversity and Desertification
- Country resource cap modality for LDCF (\$20 million) and for SCCF
- Major initiatives and regional/global efforts from agreed 10% cap for LDCF
- Further synergy with GEF TF
- Aspirational MDB targets and ceiling to address agency concentration
