### REPORT OF THE GLOBAL ENVIRONMENT FACILITY

Note by the Secretariat

The Conference of the Parties decided at its first meeting to instruct the restructured Global Environment Facility to prepare and submit through the Convention Secretariat an annual report on its operations in support of the Convention. Attached to this note is the Report to the second meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity, prepared by the Global Environment Facility.

## INTRODUCTION

1. The first meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity took place in Nassau, the Bahamas, from 28 November to 9 December 1994. At that meeting, the Conference of the Parties decided "that the restructured Global Environment Facility (GEF) shall continue to serve as the institutional structure to operate the financial mechanism under the Convention on an interim basis, in accordance with Article 39 of the Convention". The Conference of the Parties also requested the GEF to prepare and submit an annual report on its operations in support of the Convention.<sup>1</sup> The Conference of the Parties further requested that the report, in particular, include information on the following:

- (a) a synthesis of the different projects under implementation;
- (b) a list of project proposals submitted by eligible Parties for funding, reporting on their approval status;
- (c) a review of the project activities approved by the restructured GEF and their outcomes, including information on funding and progress in implementation.

2. This report has been prepared in response to that request. It covers the activities of the GEF relating to the Convention on Biological Diversity that were undertaken during the GEF FY95 (July 1994 through June 1995).

## GEF COUNCIL

3. During the reporting period, the GEF Council held four meetings (July 1994, November 1994, February 1995, and May 1995). At each Council meeting, the Convention on Biological Diversity was represented by the Executive Secretary of the Convention. The Executive Secretary addressed each meeting, and participated in a question and answer session with the Council.

4. In particular, the Conference of the Parties may wish to note that the Council took the following decisions at these meetings:

- (a) Appointed Mr. Mohamed T. El-Ashry to serve for three years as the Chief Executive Officer/Chairperson of the Facility;
- (b) Approved guidelines for the programming of GEF resources in 1995, pending the approval of the GEF long-term operational strategy in October 1995<sup>2</sup>;

- (c) Approved its rules of procedure;
- (d) Approved procedures for the participation of NGO representatives in Council meetings and for the convening of NGO consultations prior to regular Council meetings;
- (e) Approved the GEF project cycle;<sup>3</sup>
- (f) Approved two work programs;
- (g) Reviewed the role and mandate of the Scientific and Technical Advisory Panel (STAP);
- (h) Approved the policies on eligibility for, and the use of, resources for the Project Development and Preparation Facility (PDF);
- (i) Approved an approach on estimating agreed incremental costs, while recognizing the need for a flexible application of the concept of incremental costs; and
- (j) Reviewed the status of the consultations on a memorandum of understanding between the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity and the GEF and requested the Secretariat to report to it on the content of the proposed memorandum of understanding at its meeting in July 1995.

5. During the forthcoming fiscal year (FY96: July 1995 to June 1996) the Council is expected, among other things, to<sup>4</sup>:

- (a) approve an operational strategy;
- (b) approve a monitoring and evaluation system;
- (c) approve a policy on public involvement in GEF activities, including community participation in GEF projects;
- (d) approve its first Annual Report; and
- (e) consider means to promote private sector involvement in GEF activities.

## **GUIDANCE FROM THE CONVENTION**

6. At the first Council meeting after the Conference of the Parties met in November/December 1994, the guidance of the COP was transmitted to the Council. The Council took note of the guidance and authorized the GEF Secretariat to carry out appropriate consultations with the Secretariat of the Convention on Biological Diversity on the content of a memorandum of understanding to govern the relations of the Convention and the GEF.

7. During the reporting period, the Secretariat has been developing with the Implementing Agencies, STAP, and the secretariats of the global environment conventions a proposed long-term operational strategy for the GEF. The strategy is to be reviewed by the Council at its meeting in July 1995, is to be revised on the basis of the Council's comments, and is to be submitted to the Council for approval at its meeting in October 1995. The operational strategy that is under preparation incorporates fully the guidance received from the COP. The operational strategy is to be a flexible instrument, and modalities for its application in the programming of GEF activities will make provision for the integration of guidance received from the Conference of the Parties as such guidance evolves.

## **ESTABLISHMENT OF THE GEF OPERATIONS COMMITTEE (GEFOP)**

8. Following the Council's decisions in November 1994 to proceed with the proposed GEF project cycle on an interim basis and to proceed with programming of GEF funds in 1995, the CEO of the GEF established the GEF Operations Committee (GEFOP). The GEFOP is chaired by the Secretariat and consists of staff from the three Implementing Agencies, the GEF Secretariat, and the Chair of the Scientific and Technical Advisory Panel (STAP). Representatives of the secretariats of the Biological Diversity Convention and of the Climate Change Convention are invited to attend relevant GEFOP meetings, as appropriate. The GEFOP is the key interagency committee to oversee the GEF operational work. In particular, it is responsible for:

- (a) keeping under review operational aspects of the GEF project cycle including: (i) the operation of the Project Preparation and Development Facility (PDF); (ii) the development of the pipeline of GEF activities; (iii) operational coordination and programming; and (iv) operational monitoring and evaluation, including national and local consultations;
- (b) reviewing all GEF project proposals for inclusion in the work program to be submitted by the Secretariat to the Council, including recommending actions to be taken with respect to such projects;
- (c) providing advice on the conduct of the annual portfolio reviews of GEF operations;
- (d) advising the CEO on all aspects related to GEF operational work and ensuring that key operational policy issues are brought to his attention in a timely manner; and
- (e) undertaking, at the request of the CEO, ad hoc operational tasks as may be required.

## PROJECTS CONCERNING BIODIVERSITY

9. Annex A of this document contains a list of biodiversity projects included in the two work programs approved by the Council in FY95 (GEF-1). In the current reporting period, the Council-approved work programs that included nine projects in the biodiversity focal area with combined financing of \$65.27 million. Annex A also indicates for each project: the GEF Implementing Agency responsible for the project; the executing agency of the project; the convention guidance to which the project relates; the date of entry into work program; the date the project is approved by the Implementing Agency; the estimated duration of the project; information on financing; and the project's approval status. Annex B is a summary description of the projects listed in Annex A. All biodiversity projects that were proposed to the Council in the two work programs were approved by the Council. In preparing proposals for inclusion in the two work programs, the Implementing Agencies took fully into account the guidance approved by the Conference of the Parties at its first meeting. At the meetings of the GEFOP which reviewed project proposals concerning biodiversity, representatives of the secretariat of the Convention on Biological Diversity participated. The views of the convention secretariat were solicited on each project proposal in the biodiversity focal area. In particular, whenever a question was raised as to a country's eligibility under the financial mechanism or as to whether a project proposal was consistent with the guidance of the Conference of the Parties, the views of the convention secretariat were sought.

10. Under the GEF pilot phase, the GEF financed fifty seven projects in the biodiversity focal area with total financing of \$313.4 million. Also in the pilot phase, through the Small Grants program, an additional three hundred five biodiversity projects were financed at a cost of \$5.392,460.<sup>5</sup> During the current reporting period, fourteen of the projects endorsed in the pilot phase received final approval by the Implementing Agency concerned. A list of those projects is set forth in Annex C.

## PROJECT PREPARATION AND DEVELOPMENT FACILITY (PDF)

11. Careful preparation of project ideas is an essential prerequisite for quality projects. When a recipient country needs financial and technical help with project preparation, it may seek such assistance from a variety of sources. GEF project preparation funding is available through the Project Preparation and Development Facility<sup>6</sup>. Where feasible, the PDF will normally complement other sources of financing for project preparation, such as World Bank loans, UNDP technical assistance grants, bilateral finance and private funds. GEF project preparation resources are to be allocated on an incremental cost basis; i.e., in proportion to the likely level of project preparation costs financed by the non-incremental financier.

12. PDF financing is available for project preparation financing under three Blocks. Table 1 is a summary of the objectives and approval procedures for each of the blocks. Annex D contains a list of PDF funding approved to date for biodiversity projects.

#### INTERSECRETARIAT COLLABORATION

13. The convention secretariat and the GEF Secretariat have established a constructive and collaborative relationship of frequent consultations to facilitate coordination of the work of the Convention and the work of the GEF concerning biodiversity.

14. Following a recommendation of the GEFOP, a Task Force meeting was held to review how a system of country assistance for "Enabling Activities" in biodiversity could be developed and implemented in order to ensure programmatic cohesion, mutual support among the GEF Implementing Agencies, cost-effective assistance to countries, and cumulative progress towards conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity. The meeting was held at UNEP Headquarters in Nairobi in April 1995, and was chaired by the Executive Secretary of the Convention.

15. As authorized by their respective governing bodies, the Secretariats of the Convention and the GEF have carried out consultations on the content of a memorandum of understanding to be concluded by the Conference of the Parties and the Council of the GEF regarding the institutional structure operating the financial mechanism of the Convention. The results of these consultations are to be reviewed by the GEF Council at its meeting in July 1995 and will be submitted to the COP at its second meeting in November 1995.

16. As noted above, the Secretariat of the Convention is regularly invited to participate in GEFOP meetings when projects concerning biodiversity are under review. The Secretariat has also actively participated in the three-day interagency consultations that were convened in May 1995 to assist in the preparation of the long-term operational strategy for the GEF.

17. The representatives of the Convention Secretariat have attended all GEF Council meetings, and paragraph 11 of the Rules of Procedure for the GEF Council provides:

"Consistent with paragraph 27 of the Instrument, representatives of...the Convention on Biological Diversity shall, on a reciprocal basis, be invited to attend the Council meetings and, as appropriate, to make a general introductory statement at each regular Council meeting and be provided with an opportunity after their statements, to respond to questions from Members. In addition, such representative, subject to paragraphs 25 and 26, may intervene in the discussion of relevant agenda items before the Council."

**CI Project Descriptions - BIODIVERSITY  
(APPROVED BY COUNCIL 5/95)**

**Bolivia and Peru: Conservation of Biodiversity in the Lake Titicaca Basin**

UNDP

The project adopts an ecosystem approach and places emphasis on working directly with indigenous peoples and local communities and on establishing clear integration of conservation and development efforts. All of these aspects are given priority in the Convention on Biological Diversity.

**Central African Republic: A Highly Decentralized Approach to Biodiversity Protection and Use: The Bangassou Dense Forest**

UNDP

This project protects and stabilizes a key component of the tropical forest of Central Africa, by making hunting and other forms of resource use more sustainable, and controlling burning and other activities which inhibit natural forest regeneration, thereby protecting globally-significant biodiversity.

**China: Nature Reserves Management**

UNDP

In accordance with China's NEAP and BAP priorities, this project will prepare and implement management plans in five priority protected areas, train staff, fund physical investments, and work with communities adjacent to and within PA boundaries to create incentives for sustainable resource use. A second component will restructure a major timber industry in Changqing and create a core protected area on giant panda habitat, surrounded by a limited-use experimental zone. The project will build technical and managerial capacity of DNR through developing a national training team for biodiversity. It will fund a national nature reserve plan, equipment, policy studies and research, and set up an information management system.

*Associated Bank Project: Forest Resource Development & Protection Project*

This project will enhance the productivity of forest resources, the efficiency of resource use and the institutional capacity for sustainable management in commercial plantations, watershed protection forests and nature reserves. Specifically, it will establish 620,000 ha of intensively managed plantations, established 280,000 ha of watershed protection forests, support improved management of nature reserves and natural forest, strengthen technical support services in the forestry sector, and strengthen forest sector institutions.

**Djibouti: Development of a National Biodiversity Strategy**

UNDP

This project's overall development objectives are to preserve endemic and endangered terrestrial and marine wildlife and their habitats; to incorporate wildlife conservation as an integral part of sustainable development; to strengthen the institutional capacity of governmental agencies and NGOs. This will make Djibouti an important contributor to regional and international efforts on environmental sustainability and biodiversity as intended by the Convention on Biological Diversity.

**Guatemala: Integrated Biodiversity Protection in the Sarstun-Motagua Region**

UNDP

This project protects a wide array of threatened ecosystems containing globally important biodiversity by launching an integrated program for resource conservation and sustainable use in the Sarstun-Motagua region, focusing on the management of the nine protected areas. Project is based on premise that programs for biological conservation must include the promotion of sustainable economic uses of biological resources by communities living in and around the protected areas.

**India: Ecodevelopment**

World Bank

This project and its associated IDA credit will integrate conservation & development objectives in 7 threatened, priority sites representative of India's varied ecosystems. It will support improved protected area management, emphasizing joint management with local communities; village development plans and agreements that address the negative interactions of local communities on biodiversity and develop and build upon the positive interactions; and research (biological and policy), education, and institution-building to improve knowledge of, and support and capacity for, ecodevelopment activities.

**Indonesia: Kerinci Seblat Integrated Conservation and Development**

World Bank

The project and associated IBRD loan will secure the future of the exceptionally biologically rich, 1 million ha. Kerinci-Seblat National Park by integrating park management and conservation with local and regional development. Park management and protection will be strengthened, based on collaborative linkages with buffer-zone communities, and local NGOs and governments. The project will stabilize land use ~~inside~~ outside the park by promoting local-community and alternate livelihood activities consistent with park conservation objectives, and by improving overall local land use to relieve pressure on the park. A concession management component will help manage and maintain a permanent buffer zone in lowland forest concessions surrounding the park. The project will strengthen regulatory guidelines for inter-provincial, regional planning; improve conservation awareness locally and in the government; provide training and extension services to villages, park staff and local government staff; and monitor and evaluate biodiversity conservation, human impacts and sustainable development in and around the park.

**Lebanon: Strengthening of National Capacity and Grassroots In-Situ Conservation for the Sustainable Biodiversity Protection**

UNDP

This project conserves endemic and endangered terrestrial and marine wildlife and their habitats, incorporates wildlife conservation as an integral part of sustainable human development, strengthens the institutional capacity of governmental agencies and NGOs, restoring and upgrading eco-tourism, and promoting national reconciliation.

**Mauritius: Biodiversity Restoration**

World Bank

This project will continue efforts to restore degraded habitat on Rodrigues, the ~~and~~ ~~Réunion~~ and Round Island. It will propagate and reintroduce ~~the~~ ~~endangered flora, and fauna on these three islands, and strengthen local technical and administrative skills for conservation and management.~~
